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In recent years, the ability for young people to achieve more than their parents has declined, in part because of the lack of reliable, affordable transportation. Compared to car ownership that includes insurance, repairs, parking, and gas that averages 13k a year, **transit is highly affordable and can be a key to moving up the social ladder**.

Transit Enables Economic Mobility:

• Commuting time is the single strongest factor in escaping poverty. If someone has a longer commute, their odds of moving up the social ladder are greatly reduced; even more so than crime, test scores, or the percentage of two-parent families in a given community.¹

- Investing in public transit strengthens a cost-effective network for commuters, children, and so many others to get where they need to go. Riders can save over \$13,000 a year by using public transit over driving.²
- The average household spends 16 cents to every dollar on transportation. 93% of this goes to buying, maintaining, and operating cars, the largest expenditure after housing.³
- The poorest fifth of Americans spend 40% of their income on transportation.⁴ In metro **Detroit, the average household spends 19.4% of their income on transportation**.⁵ It's recommended to spend only 10-15% of your budget on transportation.
- For refugees, poor public transportation was identified as the No. 1 obstacle to self-sufficiency.⁶

"About a quarter of my budget goes to transportation."

 Hector Solis, who doesn't own a car, relies on transit and rideshare to get around. While not cheap, he says it's much better than paying high car insurance rates.⁷
