



How Transit Attracts Young People to Michigan

Michigan's population is stagnant, as Millennials and Gen Z leave Michigan. Many non-profits, businesses, and government agencies have sought to solve Michigan's Population Crisis. But the solution isn't that complicated. **The missing piece in the population puzzle is a robust, reliable transit network connecting Michigan**. The facts don't lie: Gen Z and Millenials want transit, and are willing to move to find it.

What to Know

- 73% of Millennials say they wish Detroit had access to mass transit.¹
- 90% of Gen Z and millennials polled indicated they'd pay more for a home in a walkable, transit-oriented community; a third say they'd 'pay a lot more'.²
- In 2022, Michigan had 25% fewer teen drivers than in 2012. This is one of the largest rates of decline in teen drivers across the country.³ Young Michiganders want to rely on transit, and will move for transit if needed.
- Paul Jones III, an urban planner from Detroit, badly wanted to stay in Detroit, but he had to move elsewhere in order to progress his career due to the lack of thought towards public transportation. ⁴
